Friday 5th April 2024

This is a day trip to Lakeside Station in Emerald by coach. From there we board Puffing Billy for the 40 minute ride to Gembrook station. The Gembrook Motorist Museum is but a 50 metre walk from the station.

Depending on numbers, you will be split into groups with one group doing the tour and the others having a tea/coffee. Groups will change places at relevant points through our 1hr 50 min stop.

Then it's all aboard Puffing Billy for the trip back to Lakeside Station where we rejoin our coach for the drive home.

A morning tea & boxed lunch is included and we arrive back in Warragul around 5pm.

MONT DE LANCEY & KURTH KILN BUS TRIP

On a fine sunny day, Thursday 8th February, 40 members undertook a day trip to the historic home site of Mont de Lancey (near Wandin). Starting off right with a morning tea at the site (thanks again Val Hardy for your magnificent fruit cakes) we did a cash refund of \$5 for each participant because having over the minimum 30 members, the cost per person was significantly reduced.



After a short film on the settlement in the area, we split into two groups. One group toured through the house while the other group went to the small church on the site to witness a "wedding". The latter was great fun with our members participating in the performance. At least there was no bigamy involved, as the Neil's who posed as the marrying couple have been married for almost six decades (Diamond Anniversary is in March).







Touring through the house, the rooms were very small as was typical in that era, but all were well presented with lots on nicknacks and story boards explaining how each room was used.



Between the church and the homestead,

we also got to look around in the huge blacksmiths shop. Everything had to be made on site and by hand, there being no Bunning's stores at the time.

We ate our delicious boxed lunch in the gazebo and under the trees of the site, thanks to the efforts of the volunteer staff who carted 40 chairs into the garden just for us.











Then it was back on the bus for the short drive to Kurth Kiln where the last surviving charcoal kiln that was critical to the civilian population during WWII. They burnt the charcoal in burners attached to the cars that provided carbon monoxide to power their cars because petrol was rationed for the military at that time.

As is typical in many small rural communities around Australia, local volunteers at the Kiln had done a first

class job of presenting this little known history to the generations that never had to live with the shortages in wartime.

In March David Belcher will present an equally unique view of New Zealand's South Is.



PROFILE - JAN MacLEAN



T was born in Yallourn and grew up there. After finishing High School, was awarded a teaching studentship which enabled me to go to Melbourne University. During this time, I met my husband-to -be, Don, and we

married as soon as I finished my studies. Don was a teacher at Moe High and we lived there for 3 years before moving to Belmont. My memories of that period were of playing lots of tennis whilst pregnant with our third child, going down to the beach at Torquay with the children after school, and following Polly Farmer and Doug Wade in the Geelong Football Club.

Having learnt piano from an early age, and being involved in school choirs and musicals, I joined the GAMA singers in Geelong, then when we moved to Hamilton I joined the Lydian Singers. There I had the chance to learn the pipe organ. I remember that while Don was doing corrections and baby-sitting the kids in the evenings, I'd go and practise in the big bluestone Presbyterian Church. It was spooky finding my way to shadowy back door, but once in, I'd be in another world, learning to coordinate my feet with my hands, and enjoying the sounds of that beautiful organ.

By this time Don was eligible to apply to become a principal. Back then, you made a list of where you were willing to go, and if there was a vacancy you'd be sent there. When we heard it was Hopetoun High we had to look up the map to see where it was in the middle of the Mallee! Having survived a mouse plague in Hamilton, we arrived there in a dust storm and heat wave!

However, the welcome was as warm as the weather, and we spent a very happy 6 years there. I returned to teaching French and choir - part time. That led to taking on the job of Musical Director of several productions that involved the whole school, staff and students. It was all done after school hours, and was very rewarding.

With what spare time we had, we played Saturday tennis on concrete courts in 40 plus degree heat, and also night tennis, but in thankfully, much cooler conditions.

Our next move was to Horsham, and another mouse plague! But here were beautiful cool grass courts, and a lovely golf course where we took up the game. I also resumed pipe organ playing, part-time teaching, and trained the Horsham City Christmas Choirs. And of course ferried the teenage kids around to their activities.

Don had taken up the position of Assistant Regional Director for the Mallee-Wimmera, which after 6 years, led us to Warragul in 1984 where he became Gippsland Regional Director.

Soon after arriving here I founded the West Gippsland Chorale which I'm delighted to say is celebrating its 40th Anniversary this year with big collaborations in August with the Heidelberg Choral Society and Orchestra(Brahms Requiem).

A huge honour in December, when we will be joining the Melbourne Symphony Orchestra and Chorus (Handel Messiah), both in West Gippsland Arts Centre.

In our retirement we were fortunate enough to have had several overseas trips, as well as regular visits to see our growing grand-children. We've tried out a number of beautiful Australian golf courses, and walked in some lovely bushland areas. All this despite Don having had kidney failure, then thankfully, a kidney transplant.

Don unfortunately died just before we were both about to join Probus. I don't know what he would have thought of me taking on the role of President of this club at this late stage of my life, but I'm sure he would have been the super supportive person that he was during the whole of our time together.

I know that he would have shared the honour I feel in being nominated for the position. I'll try to do my best to continue to foster the tradition of fun and friendship for which our club is renowned.
